THE POWER OF THE CAMERA

Do you love the foothills and mountains where we live and hate to see the environment destroyed by poor or illegal use? I do and from time to time I do something about it....often with my camera. I did so recently and when the problem was resolved it dawned on me that perhaps I should share this experience with members of the Placer Camera Club, so you too, can use the power of the camera.

I went fishing a few days ago in Texas Creek which runs thru a beautiful mountain meadow in upper Nevada County called Loney Meadows. While I was fishing, to my surprise 13 cows wandered across the creek, breaking down the banks of the stream, and causing mud and silt to flow down Texas Creek.

Now I know something about this creek and this meadow. Many people have worked on Texas Creek trying to rehabilitate this formally good trout stream by rip-rapping with rocks some of the stream banks and placing logs along the banks at some of the sharp turns in the creek to stabilize the banks and prevent the stream banks from eroding and covering the gravel in the stream bottom so necessary to spawning trout. There were fence post along the creek and barb wire along the post lying on the ground but apparently no one had put the barbed wire up on the posts this spring to keep the cows out. I thought this was the responsibility of the cattle people who have the Special Use Permit to graze their cattle on this meadow. But I was wrong. I later found out it was the U.S.F.S. who was responsible for the fence.

I stopped fishing and grabbed my digital camera out of my rucksack and started taking pictures of cow tracks breaking down the stream banks and pushing piles of dirt into the stream. I took about a dozen or so pictures and lost interest in catching any more fish. The very small stream became too muddy anyway.

When I got home I was so angry by the cows screwing up my pretty little trout stream it only took a few minutes to blast off an E mail to the Forest Supervisor of Tahoe National Forest along with my pictures. I also sent copies to the Dept. of Fish and Game, Audubon Society, and the Nevada County Fly Fishers. The power of E mail at work.

Well, I had gone fishing on a Thursday and by the next Tuesday I got a call from the Forest Service office in Nevada City. A young lady with the range management unit

apologized to me and said she had taken the wires down on the Loney Meadows fence last fall thinking that the meadow would winter better with the fence down and had forgotten to put them back up this spring before the cows were turned out to graze in the area. She told me that the Forest Service would put the fence back up in a few days. Wow! That is the fastest I have ever had the U.S.F.S react to one of my complaints. My elation was pre-mature.

At the end of the next week I got another call from the young lady with the Forest Service who said that she had tried to put the fence wire back up but that the wire was so rusty and rotten that it was a waste of time to try and put it back up. She said they would go into the meadows early next summer and put up new barbed wire along with many more fence posts to keep the cows out of the meadow. She also said the cows were to be taken out the following weekend anyway.

Now the problem was not resolved exactly like I wanted it to be resolved, but maybe there will be a fence up along Texas Creek next summer and maybe the fall spawning Brown Trout in the creek can spawn this month in what is left of the clean gravel and make it into the next year. You can bet I and several other people will be checking next summer to see that the job was done and the fish protected .

The power of the digital camera is there for you to use. Take pictures of things you see happening to our land, or things you do not think are right and write your government agencies and ask questions. You might be surprised at the power of your camera and your E mail. I would be most happy to consult with you when you think you have something worth photographing and writing about.
